Catholic Social Services play a critical role in reducing homelessness in our community. We operate the two largest emergency shelters in Anchorage. Brother Francis Shelter sleeps up to 240 adults age 18 and older every night. Clare House, our shelter for women with children, serves over 100 individuals every night. Both of these facilities are often at capacity.

CSS offers more than emergency shelters though to address homelessness in Anchorage. Critical support is offered to those experiencing homelessness through our Homeless Family Services program. This program is made up of case workers who help individuals who are currently homeless or in immediate danger of becoming homeless. These case workers are working at both of our shelters and throughout the community. Case workers meet with each individual to find out their specific needs. It may be medical care, mental health treatment, substance abuse services, support in finding a job or help finding an apartment. The primary goal of our case managers is to secure permanent housing for our clients. We work to get them in apartments around town, and then continue to stay connected with them to help them keep those homes. It's challenging work, but it has shown to be a proven practice in reducing homelessness.

The tragic deaths and hospitalizations this summer among our homeless community demonstrate the changing population and the urgent need for action. Reducing homelessness in Anchorage will require coordination, communication and teamwork. CSS has a nearly 50-year history of demonstrating those three characteristics, and I know we are up to the challenge now. I hope to work with all of you in a larger effort to end homelessness in Anchorage. There are great ways to get involved by volunteering or donating to CSS. On October 4th, Brother Francis Advisory Council will be holding a candlelight vigil for those in our homeless community who have died in the past year. We hope you will come and join us as we celebrate their lives on the Feast of St. Francis in the Park Strip. We hope you will join us there.

An avid hiker, hunter (caribou, bear), fisherman, and bow hunter, David also is a big time Red Sox and Patriots fan and plays the guitar. He promises to serenade staff while at work someday.

We sat down with David to ask him a few questions about his new job and his passion to help others.

- Why do you enjoy working at St. Francis House Food Pantry?
- I think we are seeing people at an entry point for social services, we are seeing the face of the working poor. The help we provide is a tangible for them and the community because now they can pay bills instead of worrying about food. Also I love how much the community supports SFH.

Without our volunteers (average 4-10 a day) we would not be able to run so smoothly.

What's surprised you about working at St. Francis House Food Pantry?

How much food is put out on a daily basis. We give out up to 5,000 pounds a day.

How can we help?

You can volunteer at St. Francis House Food Pantry (a day, a week, once a month). You can donate money or food (we are always in need of fresh fruits and vegetables). You can learn about the federal food programs and get involved in legislation that keeps food pantries open.


