But the story about Brother Francis Shelter has a much deeper meaning to those who find themselves in a desperate, homeless situation. 24-year-old Emily was facing seemingly insurmountable obstacles. She was raising her four brothers and sisters, she was pregnant, and she was homeless. Emily found help at CSS's Homeless Family Services. A case manager helped her wade through these heavy responsibilities.

Emily was able to get a job at a downtown company. But she had no transportation to get to her new job. After her younger siblings moved back in with their parents, she went to Brother Francis Shelter so she could walk to work. With help she saved money and took steps toward the independence for which she strived for. While Emily was at Brother Francis Shelter, she was able to save up enough money for a used car plus an additional \$6,000. After a brief stay at Clare House, she has moved into her own apartment. Now she anxiously awaits the day she brings her baby home.



Q Why do you want to work at Brother Francis Shelter?


A We live in an individualistic culture where the belief is that people should have the ability to pull themselves up by their bootstraps to improve their situation or solve their problems. The reality is that it takes a collective effort to help get folks on the path to self-sufficiency. I understand the struggles that many of our guests endure and my mission is to help them one at a time.

Q You were homeless as a child, what has that experience taught you?

A I remember the stigma associated with being homeless. Many believe that homeless people would not be homeless if they" just worked harder". My mother worked very hard but it wasn't quite enough to keep us housed at times. I also remember the kindness and generosity that people showed us and I try every day to pay it forward.

Q What are your goals for helping guests?

A My goal is help our guests acquire the basic level of needs such as food and shelter, so that they are then able to meet their higher level of needs and for everyone to have a place to call their own. Nobody should be living on the streets. Homelessness affects everyone. The truth is without our help, the issue will not go away. It takes a caring, passionate community to help people find and maintain housing. Homeless people are valuable worthy people that deserve just as much as anyone else does. I would invite anyone to come to Brother Francis Shelter so they can see for themselves what our guests experience as well as see the hard work each and every one of our staff members do on a daily basis.




