Jessie's Story Of Hope

BFS GUEST FINDS A PLACE TO CALL HOME


Jessie was at Brother Francis Shelter for a short time before case managers helped him find a home in our community. He originally came to Alaska to accompany his daughter and grandkids while her husband was stationed in Iraq and Afghanistan. Over the past four years

Jessie tried making it back to the rest of his family in South Carolina, but he decided to stay in Alaska, wanting to help his family here. Jessie took a hit on his finances after supporting his stepdaughter's 8-year-old baby girl who underwent open-heart surgery.

"I'm in my 60s and I've already lived some, so I'd rather see her enjoying herself," he said. "Maybe she'll have kids one day and tell them about papa—they call me papa."

Jessie was caring for his grandkids when tragedy struck. His wife was hit and killed by a car and he was left without a home. He volunteered every day at Brother Francis Shelter to make things easier for others in the shelter by doing what he knows best. "My daddy put us on the grinding stone growing up, and I used to hate it, but I realize he did it so we would learn how to work and take care of our families," he said.

Jessie is an Army veteran on a fixed



income. He visits St. Francis House Food Pantry to save his money for rent. Jessie is on track to make his way back to his kids and grandkids in South Carolina in a few years. "I'm living a good life, and the people at Brother Francis helped me so much," he says. "I want to come back to help others who are in the same place I was."

CSS HONORS 35 YEARS OF COMPASSION AND LOOKS TO THE NEXT STEP IN CARE

Brother Francis Shelter began 35 years ago through Archbishop Francis Hurley and Brothers Bob Eaton and Dave Sifferman.

After being moved out of the first overnight shelter in 1983 for fire safety concerns, Brother Bob and Brother Dave erected a tent city at the rose garden on the west end of Delaney Park Strip and invited those without a home to join them. Mayor Tony Knowles worked with Brothers Bob and Dave and Archbishop Hurley to develop a permanent structure on Post Road.

[Remembering the First Steps Cont'd] more than a shelter by providing a safe place to sleep, a hot meal, clothing, access to medical care, volunteer opportunities, community-wide resources, and comprehensive case management. One of our next steps in our mission is to answer the health needs of our guests.

Catholic Social Services has embarked on a historic partnership with the agencies representing the major Anchorage hospitals—Alaska Native Tribal Health Consortium, Alaska Regional, Providence Health & Services Alaska, and Southcentral Foundation-as well as Anchorage Neighborhood Health Center and the Municipality of Anchorage to create new services and connections. The group agreed to work together on three different projects to address healthcare among those in great need and to address rising service costs for all Alaskans, expected to be underway by February 2017.
