

# **Fact Sheet**

Fiscal Year 2024 (FY24): July 2023 - June 2024



Catholic Social Services compassionately serves those in need, strengthens individuals and families, and advocates for the common good. Through our work, we aim to transition adults and families to permanent stability. During Fiscal Year 2024, Catholic Social Services operated many multi-faceted programs, including emergency shelters, a food pantry, housing case management, services for individuals with disabilities, a refugee resettlement and immigration program, behavioral health, and more.

Catholic Social Services served a total of 18,797 people in Fiscal Year 2024.

1,461 guests stayed in one of our shelters | 553 individuals were housed though our case management programs

3,869 people were served at 3<sup>rd</sup> Avenue Resource & Navigation Center.

# 3<sup>rd</sup> Avenue Resource & Navigation Center

3<sup>rd</sup> Avenue Resource & Navigation Center is a place for adults experiencing homelessness to access a full range of services, from short-term needs to long-term engagement. In FY24, 1,813 guests accessed navigation services.

#### **Behavioral Health Services**

Behavioral Health Services provides coordinated mental health services for adults. This new program opened in March 2023 and is an option for clients to engage in Behavioral Health Services, such as behavioral health assessments and individual psychotherapy.

#### **Brother Francis Shelter**

893 guests stayed at Brother Francis Shelter.

Brother Francis Shelter provides emergency shelter to adults experiencing homelessness, providing access to meals, showers, and medical care, and the Medical Respite program. During FY24, 57% of the shelter's guests were new to the shelter, and 148 guests stayed in Medical Respite.

#### **Clare House**

Clare House provides emergency shelter, case management, and access to behavioral health services. Each day of the year, volunteers provided home-cooked meals for the guests at Clare House, totaling 70,695 meals in FY24.

388 women and children found shelter at Clare House.

### **Complex Care**

Complex Care provides support for the elderly and individuals with complex medical conditions experiencing homelessness and offers safe shelter, case management, and more. During FY24, Complex Care provided 26,711 nights of stay and 64,596 meals to guests.

## **Family Disability Services**

Family Disability Services (FDS) provides services for both children and adults with developmental disabilities, as well as offering a support system for their families.

## **Homeless Family Services**

Homeless Family Services provides case management to individuals and families experiencing homelessness. During FY24, more than 500 households were enrolled in Case Management.

# **Refugee Assistance & Immigration Services**

1,180 clients were served in Alaska by RAIS.

Refugee Assistance & Immigration Services (RAIS) provides a bridge for refugees from their former lives to their new ones in the U.S. RAIS operates as Alaska's primary refugee resettlement agency and has helped a historical number of refugees. In FY24, RAIS welcomed 412 new arrivals.

### **St. Francis House Food Pantry**

SFH is one of the largest food pantries in Alaska, providing hundreds of families each month with an emergency supply of food at no cost to the client. During FY24, St. Francis House provided food to 4,739 households.

# **Supportive Family Services**

Supportive Family Services provides holistic support to families with a variety of needs through parents classes, coaching, and skill-building. SFS uses a two-generational approach with the aim of ending the cycle of poverty and homelessness. Through SFS, 262 individuals were housed.
